Schenectady was identified as one of the 20 cities in New York State that have been the most impacted by gun violence and Schenectady County Connects was the recipient of funding through the Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, Office of Children and Family Services, and Department of Labor to support positive youth development programming in an effort to curb gun violence.
